

Beyond Anthropology

Dear Ralph,

Thank you for another excellent issue of IJFM. I would like to raise a question for you to consider. It is the matter of broadening the attention of missionaries and missiologists to the whole of the social sciences, as opposed to an understandable, but rather narrow focus on anthropology.

Darrell Whiteman's second article on "Anthropology and Mission" was most helpful for its historical detail. However, it seems to me that the time has come for us to use all of the social sciences. Rebecca Lewis' most interesting article is a good example. She uses the theories advanced by the sociologist, Rodney Stark, in a most effective way. He is perhaps the first well-known sociologist to study missions, and I am glad you have recommended his books. As you know, he attacks the anti-religious bias of many of his colleagues.

There are historical reasons for the separation of the disciplines within the social sciences. Much of this has been exacerbated by the fact that anthropology and sociology (and the others) have different professional organizations, journals, book reviewers, etc.—in other words, different "social networks!"

Missiology also needs political science and economics to understand other factors affecting missions. However, I would place anthropology and sociology at the core for missiological attention.

... Yes, the social sciences, like the natural sciences, are "secular" disciplines, but they are disciplines based on a particular methodology. Of course, many scientists (social scientists more than natural scientists, and anthropologists more than sociologists) make a philosophy or an anti-theology out of the methodology. Namely, they make God irrelevant to total reality, not just to the study of empirical reality. However, good science certainly does not require this. In fact, this introduces an often unrecognized anti-religious bias to studies.

Actually, scientific study does not keep God out, but only our theology (or thought about God) out of the study. This helps to limit the influence of sin in our theology, as well as the sin that is in anti-religious thought. There may well be a philosophy of science (the place of science in thought), but science itself cannot be a philosophy. It is too bad that people universalize the assumptions of scientific methodology and then attack it as being anti-theological. To me, this is what Milbank does in his attack on sociology or "social theory." He is really only attacking the philosophers who have built an anti-religious philosophy on their notion of science, not the disciplines of either the natural or social sciences or the good work of some anti-Christian scientists.


